From Father Joseph Farber

From the very beginning, Christians' relationship to the Law of Moses has caused difficulties in the Church. Until the turn of the first century, Christians proudly thought of themselves as a sub-sect, an enlightened sect, of Judaism. St. Paul is the prime example of this self-understanding. Gentile "Godfearers" (non-Jews who worshiped and associated with Jewish synagogues) were considered by this sub-sect to have been "grafted into the Olive Tree" but without the requirements of circumcision, keeping kosher, and following all the other commandment of the Law. This was a problem because Jews understood themselves to have been chosen by God to receive *and* follow the Law. Following that Law as closely as possible was their means of showing thankfulness and faithfulness to God.

The Law is central to Jewish identity. If one converts to Judaism, one is expected to follow the Law. Christians like Paul taught that it was not necessary to follow the letter of the Law, but always necessary to follow the Spirit of the Law. Technically speaking, you could even break the Law and eat meat sacrificed to pagan idols, although the real question, says Paul to the Corinthians, is whether by doing so you might cause offense to someone else. The question for Christians, he says, is not whether it is lawful; we don't care whether it is lawful or not, because we are free of the law. What we really care about, says Paul, is whether it is helpful. In short, Christians understood themselves to be required to always do the loving thing, rather than merely follow what was lawful. Thus, Christians saw no necessity for circumcision, keeping kosher, or even avoiding table fellowship with other Gentiles, even though these are clear commands of the Law.

Largely because of this stance, Christians were eventually kicked out of the synagogues around 100 AD. (Though it seems that Christians continued to associate and worship with Jews well into the 4th and even 5th century. This we know because the Greek Patriarch John Chrysostom (349-407) who thought of Christianity as a principally Gentile religion, complains about Christians continuing to live and worship with Jews and not separating themselves from Jewish life.)

Keeping oneself pure from defilement as defined by the law and seeking purification from defilement when it inevitably occurs was essential to Jewish identity as a separate people. Christians, in sharp contrast, held that God had made nothing which was by its nature defiled, and that any act done in faithfulness and love, even if unlawful (like plucking grains of wheat on the Sabbath (Mt 12), or welcoming Gentiles into fellowship (Acts 10)), is pure in the eyes of God.

In 1 Corinthians 13:4-7, St. Paul gives us a laundry list of what Christian love ("agape") looks like: "Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does

not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres."

For Christians, the Law is a reference point, but it can never be finally determinative of what constitutes good or bad behavior. Indeed, over and over the New Testament calls upon us to do our own constant discernment, constantly "testing the spirits" to see if our own actions are rightly motivated.

For early (male) Christians, whether or not to get circumcised was a huge issue. Jesus was a Jew, so it made sense to fully convert to Judaism if you intended to follow him. Both Scripture and tradition were unequivocal: If you want to share in the blessings of God's Chosen, you *have to* be circumcised and you *have to* follow all the other 613 commandments, as well. Paul says no. God is doing something new. The Spirit that informs the Law of Moses, says Paul, is the Spirit of Love, the Spirit of Holiness. Christians, he says, should always follow the Spirit rather than the letter of the Law.
